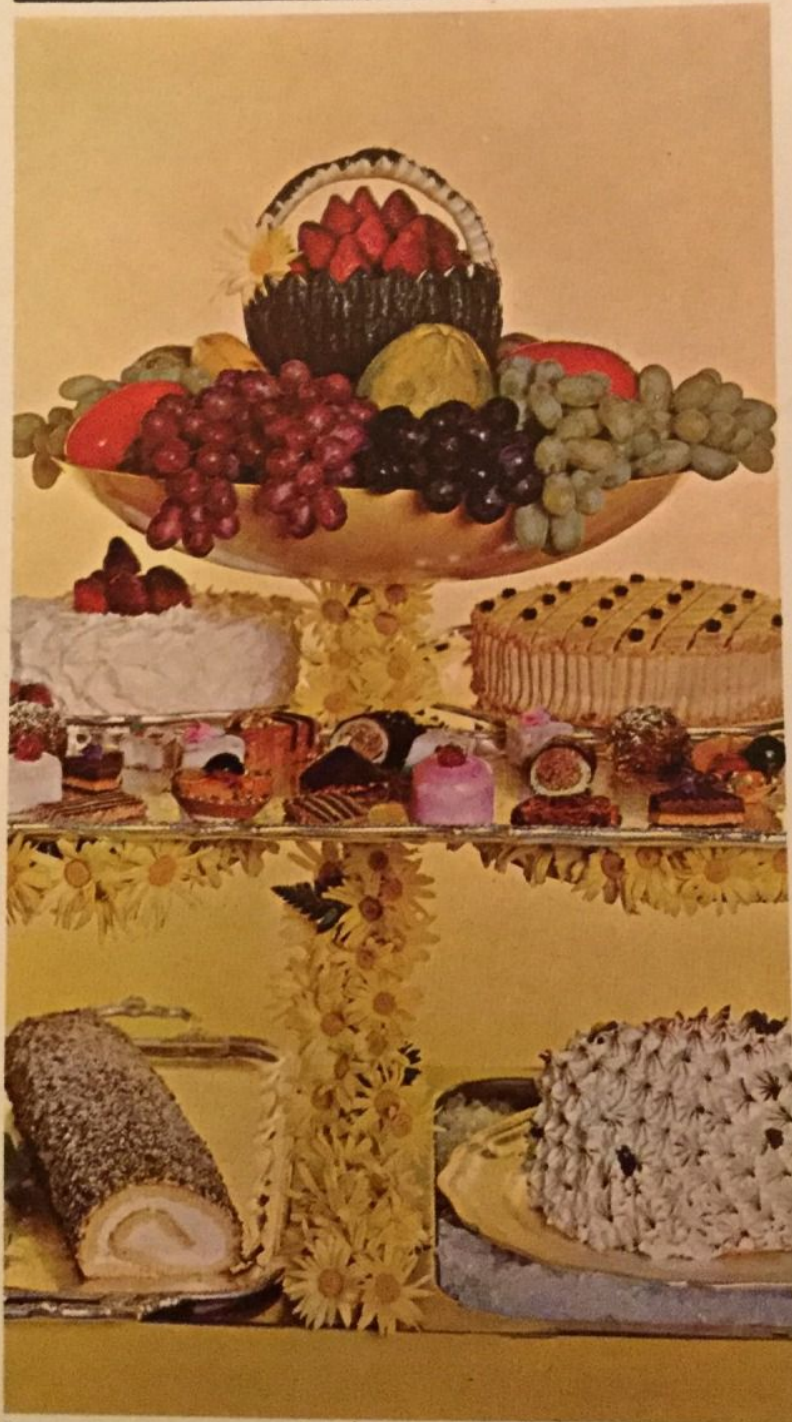


FOOD at the FAIR

For only 99¢ you can have a refreshing, and genuine, plate of Alaska King Crab at the *Alaska* pavilion. Or you can have a complete dinner in the attractive *Brass Rail Country Farm* restaurant for only \$2.75.

Enjoy Hawaiian-American food at the Restaurant of the 5 Volcanos in the *Hawaii* pavilion for \$2.95 up or Mexican-American specialties at *New Mexico's Hitching Post* for \$2.49.

Rheingold's Little Old New York offers pleasant dining, indoors or out, from snacks to dinner. Dinner starts at \$1.45. The *Schaefer* pavilion, too, offers Texas Weiners at 25¢, a sumptuous buffet at \$3.25.



Enjoy a glamorous view of the Fair from the sky-high *Top of the Fair* restaurant, where excellent family lunches cost \$3.50 and up, or bask in New Orleans elegance at *Bourbon Street's French Market*, where the prices start at 25¢ and the food is delicious.

Snacks, Treats and Specialties!

Throughout the Fair, and particularly in the *International Plaza*, you will come across dozens of snack bars that offer exotic fare for very little.

You'll want to try fishwiches, chunks of sugar cane, Cus-Cus (*Guinea*), egg foo yumburgers, Kosher hot dogs (*Israeli-American* pavilion), fresh pineapple on a stick, fruit ices and drinks.

Try the Bel Gem waffles at the *Belgian Village*. Whipped cream and strawberries on a waffle. 99¢. Soft shell crabs at *Fisherman's Wharf* in the

Maryland pavilion are delicious—60¢. Look for the Ecuadorian banana dogs—banana fritters on a stick for 50¢—in the *International Plaza*.

You get all the 7-Up you can drink with your platter of delectable international sandwiches at the 7-Up pavilion, all for \$1.50.

Watch pizza being made at *Mastro Pizza*, and then have a generous slice for 25¢.

Cool off with frozen mocha custard at the *Swiss* pavilion—15¢.

As you can see, the World's Fair is a world of wonderful food at prices you can afford. Come to the Fair—and bring your appetite!

International Delicacies

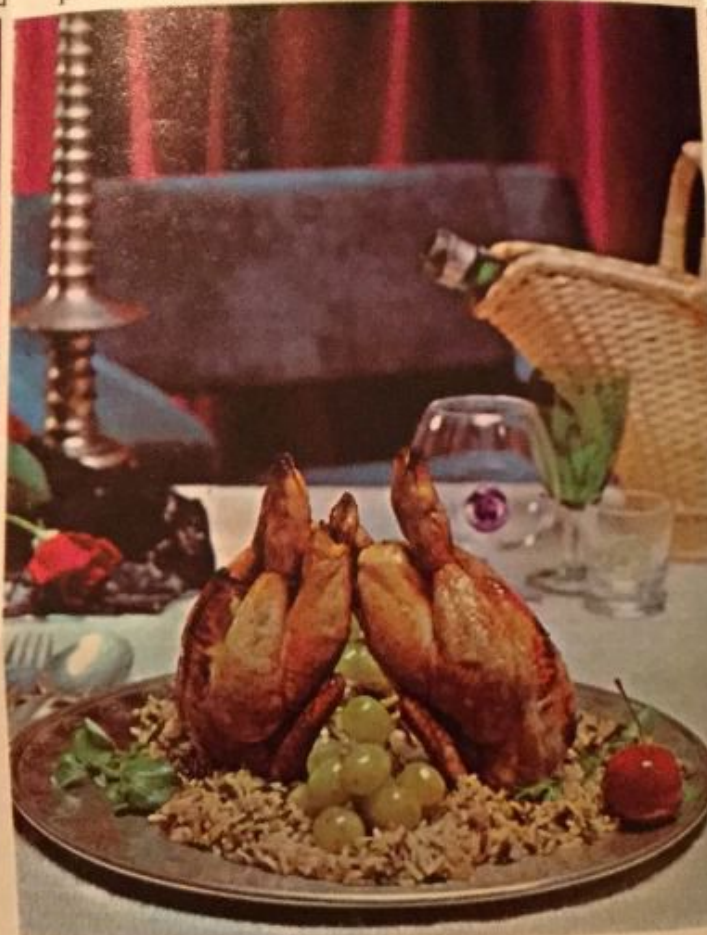
You can have lunch at the Kum-Kang-San (snack bar) in the Korean pavilion for only \$1.10. Or at the outdoor Cafe Belgique in the Belgian Village for 50¢ to \$1.75. *Shish Kebob* at the Morocco pavilion is just \$1.00.

And a full-course Chinese dinner at the Chun King restaurant is only 99¢.

You may want to try *Nasig Kuning*, a traditional thanksgiving meal at the Indonesian pavilion. The cost is \$6.50, including entertainment by Indonesian dancers and musicians. For the same price, you can eat as much as you want from the fabulous

"cold" (smorgasbord) at the Danish pavilion. Or try this idea. Get a "mezze tray" (combination of 5) at the Lebanon pavilion for \$2.50 and order a "chawarma" (lamb shavings) on the side (99¢) and you'll have enough for two!

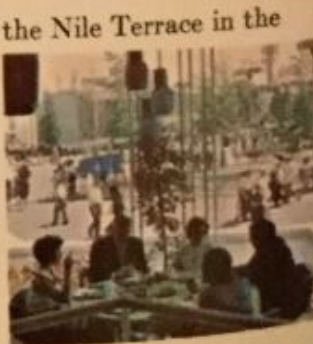
Spend as much, or as little as you like. A truly magnificent meal at the Toledo in the Spanish pavilion will cost a minimum of \$7.00, while a

splendidly exotic dinner at the Nile Terrace in the Sudan pavilion will cost a maximum of \$3.00. At an in-between price (around \$4.50) you can eat in the lofty Tree House at the African pavilion where the children can feed Suzy the giraffe.

This is just a sample, for there are more than forty



restaurants in the International pavilions at the Fair which serve enticing native foods. You will be tempted to try them all.

American Favorites

For those who prefer more familiar food, there are over fifty delightful restaurants to choose from, at every price range. Here are a few:



Strawberries and whipped cream on a Belgian waffle

The *Missouri Snack Patio* serves a popular barbecued ham or beef platter for 95¢, and one of the best hot dogs you've ever tasted. Or how about a buffalo steak at the *Montana* pavilion restaurant—\$1.75.

You can spend about \$6.50 for an exceptional dinner in the elegant atmosphere of the Festival/65 restaurant at the *Festival of Gas* pavilion; or you can dine in the charming Nantucket Inn in the *Greyhound Post House* for \$1.95. Tad's Steakhouse in the *Wisconsin* pavilion offers a full-course steak dinner for \$1.29. *Carousel Park* in the Lake Area offers a chicken dinner for \$1.39.
