

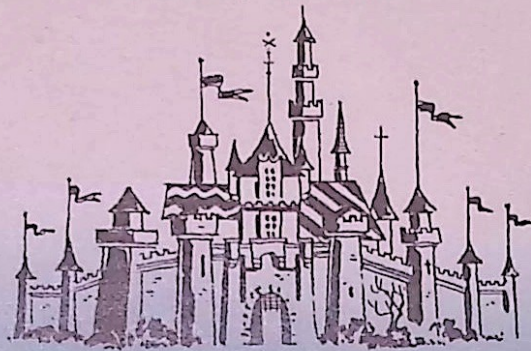

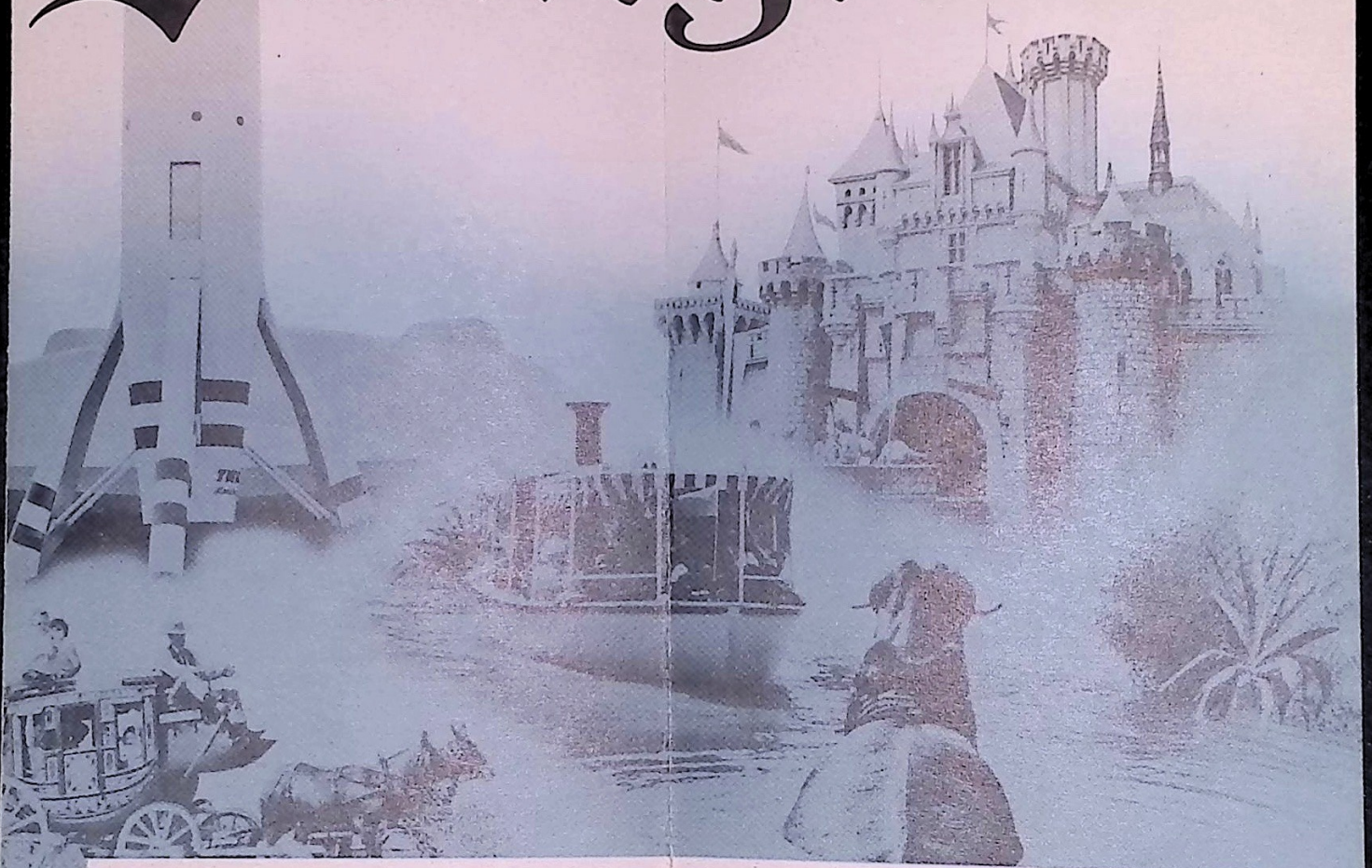

60 acres of Fun, Thrills, Excitement! *Fantasyland*, dream world of Peter Pan and Snow White, Mickey Mouse and Dumbo, the Elephant . . . *Tomorrowland*, blueprinting the world of the future, of space stations, moon rockets and push-button living . . . *Adventureland*, the "wonderland of Nature's own design" . . . *Frontierland*, authentic recreation of America's thrilling pioneer past, from Revolutionary Days to the Southwest settlement . . . *Main Street, U.S.A.*, small-town America at the turn of the century brought back to life . . . all these are DISNEYLAND, "The Happiest Place on Earth."



## MAIN STREET U.S.A.

A nostalgic re-creation of an American small town Main Street in the happy, peaceful era of the turn of the century. At the railroad depot you can board the Santa Fe and Disneyland passenger train for an exciting ride around the Park. Ride, too, in the historic, horse-drawn street cars or the old-fashioned fire wagon. And visit the authentic old-time shops and stores . . . the Ice Cream Parlor, Penny Arcade, Bakery, Butcher Shop and Grocery, Drug Store, Music Shop, Photographer's, Printer's . . . the City Hall and Police Station, and old-time Movie House.

## TOMORROWLAND

Ride TWA's rocket to the moon at 172,000 miles an hour . . . see America from a space station 500 miles up . . . with every detail scientifically correct. Drive a car of the future on Tomorrow's Freeway or a futuristic "phantom boat." See the original sets from "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea." Watch "Circarama," the amazing Technicolor motion picture on a screen that surrounds you, and "The World Beneath Us," great CinemaScope and Technicolor cartoon. See large industries' elaborate demonstrations of what the future holds for all of us . . . miracles of tomorrow's chemistry . . . 21st century use of metals.

## Fantasyland

Enter Fantasyland through the portals of an authentic medieval castle and step right out of this world. Forget care and be a child again! Fly with Peter Pan over moonlit London, visit Snow White and meet the Seven Dwarfs. Take a wild ride in Mr. Toad's 1903 vintage automobile . . . soar with Dumbo, the Flying Elephant . . . spin madly in the Mad Hatter's Tea Cup . . . ride canal boats, the hilarious Casey Jr. Train, and King Arthur's Carousel . . . laugh to famed Walt Disney cartoon film classics in the Mickey Mouse Theater.



**HOW TO GET THERE** • Disneyland is 23 miles southeast of Los Angeles on the Santa Ana Freeway at Harbor Boulevard in Anaheim, Calif., easily reached by car from all parts of Southern California (see map). From other points, see road maps or consult your local auto club.

### Public Transportation:

**METROPOLITAN COACH LINES**—frequent local and express service direct to Disneyland entrance from 6th & Main Sts., Los Angeles, daily.\* Also service from intermediate points and Santa Ana.

**TANNER GRAY LINE MOTOR TOURS**—operates one all-day and two half-day special Disneyland Tours from downtown Los Angeles every day.

**PACIFIC GREYHOUND LINES**—two morning schedules from San Diego via Long Beach. Transfer there to Southland Bus Lines direct to Disneyland.

**LOS ANGELES AIRWAYS**—operates four helicopter flights daily\* each way between Los Angeles International Airport and Disneyland's own Heliport, carrying 7 to 9 passengers. Direct on-ramp connections with TWA and other major airline flights. Through bookings from most U.S. and many foreign cities.

**ORANGE COUNTY and LONG BEACH bus systems**—check carriers locally for service and schedules.

\*Except Monday in seasons when Park is closed Mondays.

## FRONTIERLAND

An old log fort guards the entrance to Frontierland, symbolizing our American heritage. You'll see the blacksmith shop, the assay office and other frontier enterprises. Visit the western General Store, see the world's smallest horses in a miniature corral. See authentic Indian dances, and explore the Davy Crockett Museum. Take a burro ride along a winding trail. Ride in a Conestoga Wagon or Concord Stage through the Old West, fording a stream and crossing the Painted Desert. See Bluefoot Sue's fabulous old west stage show in the Golden Horseshoe Saloon (serving "pop" exclusively). And by all means, cruise the Rivers of America aboard the 105-foot paddle wheel steamboat, Mark Twain. There's a wide choice of excellent eating in Frontierland, with a Chicken Plantation Restaurant, a Pancake House and an authentic Mexican Cafe, plus light food and refreshment stands.

## ADVENTURELAND

At the threshold of Adventureland is a fabulous bazaar in a tropical setting, packed with fascinating examples of native arts and handicrafts from all over the world. Take an explorer's jungle river cruise past flowers and plants as found in Mexico, Central and South America, Africa, Asia and Australia. Here's where you'll see and hear the extraordinary, lifelike wild animals, birds and reptiles you've heard so much about, sample exotic fruit and berry beverages at a tropical "saloon." Lunches and dinners are served in the tropical restaurant on the border of Adventureland.



**HOW** much will it cost?

Admission for children under 12 is 50¢, tax-free; for adults, \$1, tax included. Parking is 25¢. Admission tickets entitle you to visit all the "Lands" and to view the many exhibits and free shows. How much more you spend depends on you, but all rides, merchandise, souvenirs, food and refreshments are popularly priced. Disneyland is designed for the enjoyment of everyone and will always be within everyone's budget. Special rates are available for groups and conventions. For these rates, please write the Director of Customer Relations, Disneyland, Anaheim, Calif.

**WHEN** is the best time?

Disneyland is open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day during summer, closed on Mondays during the rest of the year. The attendance pattern shows all days of the week about equal in number of visitors. As to time of day, be governed by your personal preferences, and time at your disposal. If you come in the afternoon, stay to see a million twinkling lights transform Disneyland into a fairyland at evening time. Southern California's mild year 'round climate eliminates the seasons as a factor in planning. Actually, *anytime* is a *good* time to visit Disneyland.

**HOW** about cameras?

By all means, bring your still or motion picture camera. You'll want to record permanently on film the fun and thrills of your Disneyland visit to show your friends. However, taking motion pictures or other pictures of Disneyland for commercial use, exhibition or for where admission is charged, is not permitted without the written permission of Disneyland, Inc.

**WHERE** can you stay?

Most convenient of all, of course, is the new Disneyland Hotel, on a 30-acre site opposite the main exit from Disneyland. There's a complete range of accommodations from modest to luxurious, plus excellent restaurant and coffee shop facilities, cocktail lounges, swimming pools, and many special features. For reservations and information call KEystone 5-8171. Good accommodations at all prices can also be found in Anaheim and neighboring communities.
