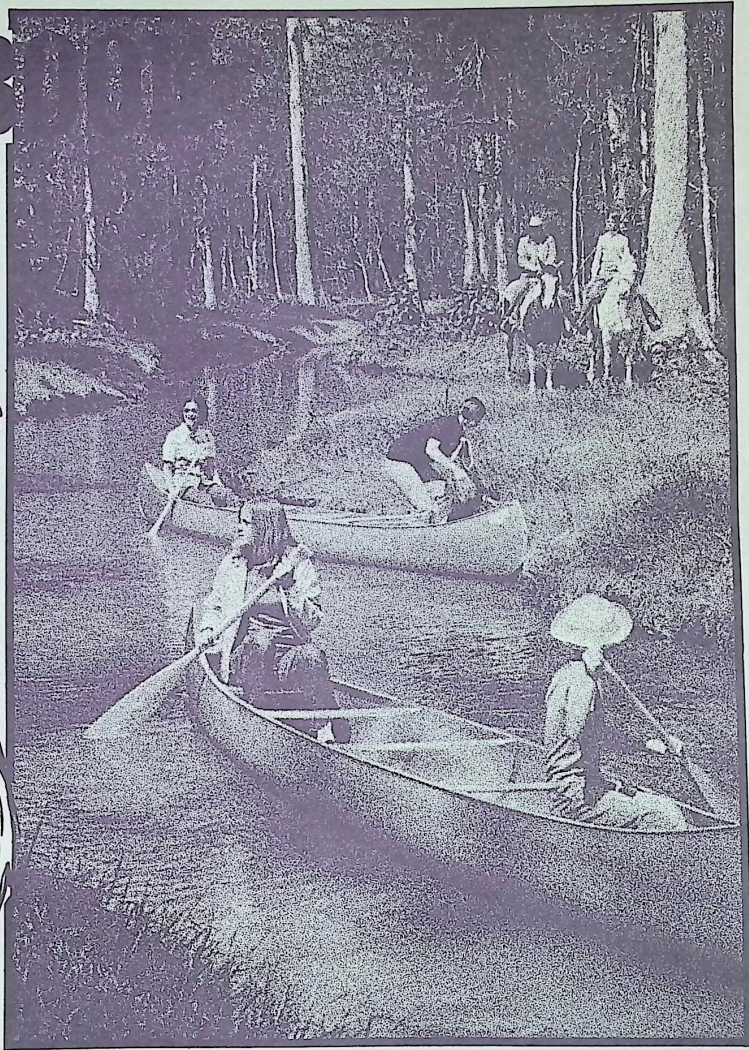


OUTDOOR RECREATION HANDBOOK



OUTDOOR RECREATION

Walt Disney World offers each guest an outdoor recreation area of approximately 2,000 acres. Activities include skin diving, swimming, sailing, water skiing, boating, bicycling, horseback riding, hiking, nature walks, golfing, camping, canoeing, or just plain relaxing in the Florida sun.

There are four and one-half miles of white sand beaches, 600 acres of wilderness camp area, two 18-hole championship golf courses, bridle trails, nature trails, bicycle paths, and 650 acres of sparkling lakes dotted with beautiful islands. Add shuffleboard courts, croquet areas, horseshoe pits, Ping-Pong tables, putting greens, and dance floors both in- and out-of-doors and you have the Vacation Kingdom of the World.

Let's take a closer look at the many areas which will make up this new outdoor world of recreation.

The Walt Disney World Golf Club is composed of two 18-hole championship golf courses, the Palm Course and the Magnolia Course, each framed by more than 1,000 trees. This challenging 36-hole layout was designed by the world-renowned golf course architect, Joseph Lee. Bill Evans, our Disney landscape architect, has taken each course and created a horticultural work of art. The Walt Disney World Golf Club is available to all guests of Walt Disney World hotels. Included in

the facilities are two practice driving areas, two putting greens, a pro shop, and the services of a P.G.A. pro.

Both courses are approximately 6500 yards long--par 72. Special services include maintenance of golf bags and clubs and transportation to and from the hotels. Golf cart fees will be included in the green fees.

The Club House includes a dining room and snack bar, a cocktail lounge, and men's and women's locker room facilities. Architecturally it features a multiple pyramid design with the exterior textured to reflect the mood of the South Seas.

WALT DISNEY WORLD OPEN GOLF

The first Walt Disney World Open Golf Tournament will take place shortly after opening. From December 2-5, professional golfers will be shooting for a share of \$150,000 in prize money.

This event will be played on the Magnolia Course, which will be expanded to 7,000 yards for the tournament.

Professional golfers throughout the country are already calling this tournament the Mickey Mouse Open.

WATERCRAFT ACTIVITIES

The 650 acres of clear, blue-green Bay Lake and Seven Seas Lagoon will be criss-crossed daily by a wide variety of watercraft, from water ski boats to outrigger canoes.

Included in the Walt Disney World flotilla are two side-wheel, 200-passenger steamboats and six steam launches, which will double as attractions and as basic transportation.

Both will be used to transport guests from the Main Entrance Complex and the Polynesian Village across the Lagoon to the Magic Kingdom entrance. They will also steer into Bay Lake for stops at the Contemporary Resort Hotel, Blackbeard's Island, and the Fort Wilderness campsite landing.

There will also be ten types of smaller craft available to guests. Some of these include Sunfish sailboats, 40-foot outrigger canoes, paddle wheel and pedal boats, and unique Bob-A-Round boats. Bob-A-Rounds are circular craft designed for the guest who values his leisure time. He can lounge on his Bob-A-Round, complete with hampers for soft drinks and sandwiches, and be shaded by a colorful canopy on a center pole which houses a card table that can be lowered for a lazy floating bridge game.

Organized activities include water polo, volleyball, basketball, swimming meets, and water carnivals.

Each day's activities will begin with daybreak dips and continue late into the evening with spectaculars like the Polynesian Village Luau Aquatic Show.

FORT WILDERNESS

Recreational vehicle owners will find a true nature experience awaiting them in Fort Wilderness.

Instead of clearing ground and inserting sites for trailers and campers, Walt Disney World "Imagineers" have literally slipped sites into place, not only among the trees, but also among the total plant growth of the area. Thus a guest can pull into a site that screens him from his nearest neighbor with pine, vine, and palmetto, and yet find required facilities near at hand.

Among these will be the Fort Wilderness Trading Post where he may stock up on staples from milk and bread to two-inch T-bone steaks for the evening's barbecue.

The camping area will also feature canoeing in creeks winding past trees and trailers and providing visitors, particularly youngsters, a place for small-boating and fishing in a unique man-made fishing hole.

Fort Wilderness will also feature a white sand beach for swimming or relaxing and a boat landing with transportation to other areas of the Lake and Lagoon, including the Magic Kingdom Theme Park.

The Tri-Circle D Ranch, near the campgrounds, will be headquarters for horseback riding, including breakfast rides and nature rides, and a good old-fashioned hay ride.

Recreational facilities are many and varied and include bicycling, nature walks, swimming programs, horseshoes, shuffle-

board, volleyball, archery, and nightly campfire programs. Indeed, something for every member of the family.

Future programs may include Huck Finn steak fries, clam bakes, square dances, and campfire parties.

"SURF" AT WALT DISNEY WORLD

Watch Beachcomber Isle out in the Seven Seas Lagoon. Soon a strange, tentacled, mechanical monster will start to be assembled there. It is going to bring an ocean atmosphere inland to Walt Disney World. The sound of surf and the sight of surfboards will soon be a reality...50 miles from the ocean.

Offshore Technology Corporation of San Diego, California, has developed this unique attraction for Walt Disney World.

Eight generator-flaps, 16 feet by 24 feet and all prefabricated, have been constructed to create waves 4 inches to 4 feet high and yet to prevent unwanted swells in other areas of the lagoon. Each wave will travel 450 feet underwater, invisible to guests, and then rise and roll 200 feet to Surfrider Beach.

These flaps will protrude approximately 2 feet above water level and will be driven by hydraulic pumps requiring a 400 HP hydraulic plant. Actually, the generator-flaps will create five waves that will superimpose to produce each basic 4-foot wave. This wave will be approximately 180 feet wide and hit Surfrider Beach just north of the Polynesian Village. A unique feature is that the angle and size of any wave can be changed.

Surfing activities will include surfboards and outriggers--South Seas style--in the early morning, late afternoon, and evening. The middle of the day will be dedicated to family fun in the surf with rafts and mats.

Yes, there will be a "surf's up" atmosphere 24 hours a day in the Vacation Kingdom of Walt Disney World.
